

Wow, is this book bad. I picked it up after listening to Roenick interviewed on a sports radio station in Chicago. During the interview, his stories were all over the place but, knowing radio interviews, I figured they were simply getting him to hit some high points. Little did I know the book was written with the same lack of organization as the interview. It seems to be a stream of consciousness book with Roenick rambling on about several unrelated topics that end up in the same chapter. Roenick

seems to set a record for the use of the word "I" and never allows you to forget the high opinion he has of himself. I loved you as a player, J.R., and rooted for you many times during your days playing at Chicago Stadium. During my reading of this book, however, I realized my cheers were reserved for his on-ice actions. Applause and cheers need not be reserved for the pen of this egotistical, self-centered masturbation.
